Prepositional Phrases

A **prepositional phrase** is a group of words that begins with a preposition and ends with a noun or pronoun. These handy dandy little phrases add more information to a sentence and often do the jobs of adjectives and adverbs.

examples: We drove over the bridge to get to the seashore.

The prepositional phrase over the bridge tells where we drove.

David planned to finish his project before noon.

The prepositional phrase <u>before noon</u> tells when David plans to finish his project.
